Star designer Summer Thornton manifests a Mexican dream home in Casa Rosada, which serves double duty as both her family's

THE PROJECT

Having discovered Sayulita, a beach town in Mexico about an hour from Puerto Vallarta, Chicago-based interior designer Summer Thornton and her husband, Josh, were smitten. "The town was full of life and had great organic food, a few cute shops and fun surf culture," says Thornton. "We often remarked that the only thing missing was a truly remarkable home with some nice resort amenities." So, after visiting for years, developing a network of locals (from a great masseuse

and a surf instructor to talented chefs), and discovering the perfect beachfront property in Sayulita in 2020, they set out to build one themselves: Casa Rosada (casarosadasayulita.com). Says Thornton, "The idea of merging the privacy and exclusivity of a luxury home with the services of a resort really offered a special vacation experience."

THE PRIORITY

"We designed Casa Rosada as our personal vacation home," explains Thornton, "so the top priority was





creating a home that we would personally love to enjoy ourselves [with friends and family]. We're directly on the beach, so most evenings include a sunset swim playing in the waves; we watch turtles nest and hatchlings go out to sea right in front of the house; and many mornings are filled with walks down the beach. As far as the design concept, I wanted Casa Rosada to pay homage to Mexican architectural history, so we found inspiration from historical homes in Mexico. I've always loved homes with a central courtyard, so that quickly became a core idea, and I'm a romantic, so the sound of the fountain and the idea of filling the courtyard with candles at night sounded dreamy."

THE CHALLENGE

"From a design perspective, the biggest challenge was selecting materials that could withstand the salt spray [from] the Pacific Ocean," Thornton says. "So we chose materials that would age beautifully, such as copper outdoor showers, which patina in the most magical way. Similarly, instead of using traditional paint, which would chip and peel, we used an ancient Mayan plaster that's a mixture of tree sap and limestone powder called chukum for the walls. It's water-resistant and ages beautifully; we tinted it to create a beautiful soft peachy pink color that is seen throughout the house."


THE DETAILS

Thornton says with pride. "The foyer is an open-air courtyard, with a traditional fountain, huge palm trees and a Moorish tile patterned floor. There's this moment of transportation from the journey to a sense of arriving somewhere magical. We have staff there with cockails in hand and the courtyard looks straight out to the ocean. It's a wow moment." She adds, "I love the hand-painted murals we commissioned [from local artists] for the house. And since there's over 300 days of sunshine in Sayulita and very consistent warm temperatures, we weren't restricted to the practicalities of other climates. Fantastical ideas like outdoor showers and soaking tubs overlooking the ocean became realities. The living room is open-air, offering the most remarkable ocean breeze that flows through it to the courtyard."

THE OUTCOME

Notes Thornton, "When we aren't personally using the home we rent it, and we've had a great response so far. Many guests have already booked return visits. We had a young bride stay at Casa Rosada for her wedding in 2024, and her sister has booked us for her wedding in 2025 because the family loved it so much. Casa Rosada is our first, but certainly not our last. We're starting to plan our next property, and our hope is to take investors and expand the concept to additional locations in the coming years."
